March 16 (Wednesday) - No-host dinner from **6:00-7:00 pm** in the basement room of Wild Boar Coffee, 1501 S. College, Fort Collins. Program begins after a short business meeting at **7:00 pm**. Program: **Erik Gantt**, Project Supervisor, Centennial Archaeology, Inc., presents **Archaeology for Art's Sake: Survey and Testing for the Over the River Art Installation**.

In 2009 and 2010 Centennial Archaeology, Inc. conducted intensive pedestrian survey and test excavated six sites for the proposed Christo and Jeanne-Claude Over the River Art Installation in the Arkansas Canyon between Parkdale and Salida. The more interesting aspects of history and prehistory illuminated by the 111 sites recorded during the project will be discussed. These include the time span and nature of the prehistoric use of the canyon, the Royal Gorge Railroad war which pitted the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe against the Denver & Rio Grande and resulted in the construction of defensive sites colloquially called

DeRemer Forts, and one example of the use of prison labor from the nearby Colorado State Penitentiary. The presentation will be informal and questions for discussion are invited.

Erik is a Project Supervisor for Centennial Archaeology, Inc. in Fort Collins and is currently the President of the Colorado Council of Professional Archaeologists. He received both his B.A. and M.A. in Anthropology from Colorado State University.

2011 Scholarships will be awarded by the Colorado Archaeological Society in memory of Alice Hamilton, who was a member of C.A.S. and avid supporter of Archaeology.

These competitive awards range from **\$200 up to \$750** each. Awards are based on the merits of the application, rather than financial need.

REQUIREMENTS

A. Applicant must be majoring in Anthropology or cross-discipline field, with emphasis in Archaeology.

B. Applicant must be attending an accredited college or university in Colorado, and carrying at least a half-time course load.

TO APPLY

1. Include a completed cover sheet with your application materials. The cover sheet is available from the CAS website at www.coloradoarchaeology.org

2. Tell how you plan to use the money, including a proposed budget of your expenses. This award may be used for research projects, lab fees, field school, tuition, books, etc.

There will be significant weighting in favor of study, projects, etc. in Colorado, the southwestern US and the Rocky Mountain area, and secondarily, in the Western Hemisphere. Other areas will be considered, based on the strength of the application.

3. Provide a resume of your archaeological accomplish-

ments (study and experience).

4. Include two (2) written references from current instructors or professionals in Anthropology/ Archaeology. These should be sent directly to us, by email (greatly preferred) or U. S. Mail. Your application will not be complete without these. They are a major part of our evaluation of your application.

5. Applications and references may be submitted by e-mail (greatly preferred) or by U.S. Mail.

- Archaeology Magazine (Jan 2011) Lists Its Top Ten Archaeological Discoveries of 2010** Decades from now people may remember 2010 for the BP oil spill, the Tea Party, and the iPad. But for our money, it's a lock people will still be excited about the year's most remarkable archaeological discoveries. This was the year we learned that looters led archaeologists to spectacular and unparalleled royal tombs in both Turkey and Guatemala. - Richard Wilshusen Named New Colorado State Archaeologist** CU grad Dr. Richard Wilshusen has been chosen to be the new State Archaeologist for Colorado. Dr. Wilshusen's 25-year career encompasses a diverse set of skills as an administrator, educator and researcher in anthropology and archaeology. He is considered a specialist on the southwest with a national reputation as an expert in the Mesa Verde and Dinéah regions, early village emergence, and public archaeology issues.
- New Effort to Designate Chimney Rock as a National Monument** A mere 30 minutes east of Durango is an archeological wonder - Chimney Rock. The 4,700-acre site is inside the San Juan National Forest and is recognized as perhaps the most significant historical site managed by the entire U.S. Forest Service, according to the federal agency. - Could Southeastern Utah Petroglyphs Represent Mammoths in the Ancient Southwest?** While researchers in northern Colorado dig up the bones of giant Ice Age mammoths, others nearby in southeastern Utah are looking at a very different record of these extinct creatures. High on a cliff overlooking the floodplain of the San Juan River, rock art specialists Ekkehart Malotki and Henry Wallace have examined several highly stylized images carved into the rock face including what they believe to be the first example of prehistoric Native American rock art to show a mammoth. Last Canyon Cave

Following Hell Gap the field camp will move to Last Canyon Cave in the Pryor Mountains of south-central Montana. The small rockshelter is yielding a 40,000 year old paleoclimatic record in the form of fauna, pollen, phytoliths, various isotopes, ingested grit, and other forms of proxy data bearing information on the paleoenvironmental conditions just prior to and confronted by the earliest Americans. Last Canyon will thus complement other sites in the region with Late Pleistocene records in other forms, such as the rich faunal record from Natural Trap Cave.

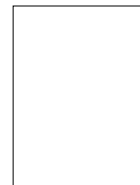

Colorado Archaeological Society Code of Ethics

- Members will uphold State and Federal antiquities laws and regulations.
- Excavation of archaeological sites will be conducted only according to professionally accepted procedures developed in consultation with a professional archaeologist and with the written permission of the landowner. The investigator has the responsibility for publication of the results of his/her investigation and for making the collection available for further scientific study.
- Members are encouraged to report archaeological sites to the Office on the State Site Report forms. Materials collected from the surface sites shall be catalogued and described in the site survey report. Collected materials should either be deposited with the State Archaeologist's office or made available for scientific study.
- Members will not support illegal or unscientifically conducted activities by participating in or condoning the sale, exchange or purchase of artifacts obtained from such sites.
- Members who exhibit artifacts will do so in an educational context. Items from burials and objects considered sacred will not be exhibited.
- Members will cooperate with the State Archaeologist and other agencies concerned with archaeology and related fields.
- Members will respect the dignity of groups whose cultural histories are the subject of archaeological investigation.
- Members will not participate in conduct involving dishonesty, deceit, or misrepresentation about archaeological matters.
