

- **Archaeological Institute of America, Denver- Lecture: What was that Horrible Thing that Happened around the World in AD 536?**
Sun, Jan 13, 2 pm, Tattered Cover Bookstore, 16th & Wynkoop, Denver. Dr. Payson Sheets, University of Colorado, Boulder, presents this lecture. The few literate cultures in AD 536 recorded intense cold, crop failures, starvation, and deaths. The worldwide sulfur circulation indicates an eruption in a tropical latitude, and greater sulfur in Greenland indicates an eruption north of the equator. Since 1969 Sheets has been investigating the eruption of Ilopango volcano in El Salvador, at 14° north latitude. Ilopango Eruption seems to be the most likely candidate for the worst worldwide disaster in the past few millennia. The presentation

includes records of the disaster, dendroclimatic dating, ice core records, possible impacts on non-literate societies, El Salvadoran research on the Ilopango eruption, and deep-sea drilling results by German scientists. Based on multiple disciplines, it appears we are moving toward understanding what happened in AD 536 and afterward. Southwestern archaeologists have always studied pottery to help them understand past human behavior. Pottery analysis informs past foodways, ethnicity, trade, migration, and religious beliefs. Recently, Southwestern ceramicists have increasingly used “high-tech” techniques – from 3D modeling to nuclear reactors – to explore these long-standing issues. This talk explores these techniques and advances Southwestern ceramicists have made in using pottery to understand past culture. Free, open to the public.


There is no doubt that with the dedication and support of our officers and members that NCC is able to function so successfully! If there is any way you would like to participate and assist, please let know!

Ron Wemple Receives Chapter Service Award at CAS Annual Meeting submitted by Bev Goering





Colorado Archaeological Society Code of Ethics

- Members will uphold State and Federal antiquities laws and regulations.
- Excavation of archaeological sites will be conducted only according to professionally accepted procedures developed in consultation with a professional archaeologist and with the written permission of the landowner. The investigator has the responsibility for publication of the results of his/her investigation and for making the collection available for further scientific study.
- Members are encouraged to report archaeological sites to the Office on the State Site Report forms. Materials collected from the surface sites shall be catalogued and described in the site survey report. Collected materials should either be deposited with the State Archaeologist's office or made available for scientific study.
- Members will not support illegal or unscientifically conducted activities by participating in or condoning the sale, exchange or purchase of artifacts obtained from such sites.
- Members who exhibit artifacts will do so in an educational context. Items from burials and objects considered sacred will not be exhibited.
- Members will cooperate with the State Archaeologist and other agencies concerned with archaeology and related fields.
- Members will respect the dignity of groups whose cultural histories are the subject of archaeological investigation.
- Members will not participate in conduct involving dishonesty, deceit, or misrepresentation about archaeological matters.

Folsom Point Submission Guidelines

The Folsom Point is published monthly September through May for the purpose of sharing information with members and friends of the Colorado Archaeological Society, Northern Colorado Chapter. Submissions are welcome and are used at the editor's discretion and may be edited for content, length, and format. Common submissions include book reviews, event announcements, volunteer help requests, activity reports, and local news items. Please follow the guidelines below. Contact the editor with any questions.

- Submit materials by the 1st of the month. The newsletter is published during the first week of the month so events or activities which occur early in the month should be submitted for publication in the prior month.
 - Include contact information in the form of a name, email address, web site, and/or phone number.
 - Illustrations can be used but they may be reduced in size and/or resolution to reduce file size.
 - Event announcements should include specific time and location information, remember not all members live in Fort Collins or even Colorado.
 - Clearly distinguish your own content from that created by others so that proper credit can be given.
 - Submit all material electronically. Acceptable document formats include Microsoft Word documents and plain ASCII text files, as well as plain text in the body of email. Acceptable image formats include .jpg, .tif, and .bmp. Adobe PDF files also can be used. Tables can be sent using Microsoft Excel or embedded in a Word document.
