Lawrence Fullenkamp has been working in Cultural Resource Management with the Forest Service in Northern Colorado since 2001. Lawrence will be presenting an overview of some of the unique archaeological resources in Northern Colorado and recruiting volunteers to assist in protecting these resources.

Archaeological Site Stewardship Opportunities on the Arapaho and Roosevelt National Forests and Pawnee National Grassland

The Forest Service manages a large number of significant and valuable archaeological resources in Northern Colorado. In recognition of the fact that prehistoric and historic archaeological materials and sites are irreplaceable national resources the Forest Service has developed an Archaeological Site Stewardship Program to help better manage these resources. The primary goals of the program are:

- To organize a contingent of conscientious volunteers who frequent areas of significant cultural resources for the purpose of reporting on site condition and observed threats to sites such as weathering, vandalism, and looting.
- Create a means of public education and involvement regarding local archaeological resources.
- Create a forum for public discourse regarding the management expectations of historic properties managed by the National Forest.
- Provide standards and guidelines for individuals and organizations that are not tied directly to compliance with federal laws.
- To create a presence to prevent looting and vandalism.
- To increase public awareness of the significance and value of heritage resources.
- To promote understanding and cooperation among the Forest Service and the public.

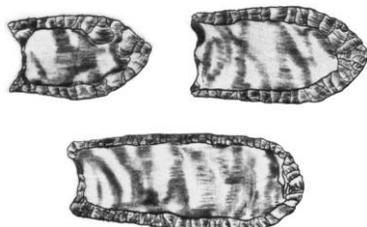
Event Description

Information on Lab work from Julia Kenyon

We'll be holding lab sessions every two weeks (Wednesdays) from 6-9 pm in the basement of Clark building on CSU campus, in room A26. We are working primarily on unpacking and fully curating the collection from Spring Gulch, a site that was dug by CSU field schools under Dr. Liz Morris in the mid-1970's but never fully processed. There's quite a diverse assemblage with plenty of lithics, faunal, ceramic, historic, etc. No experience necessary, just enthusiasm and your keenest eye.

We'll try to keep it capped at 10 volunteers per session as the lab gets a bit crowded past that. I keep the sign up list so if you would like to add your name to one of the following dates just let me know here. Lab sessions will be held every two weeks on Wednesdays from 6-9 pm, and any interested volunteers should get in touch with Julia Kenyon, the graduate student coordinator, by email (juliakenyon@gmail.com).

There is free parking on campus after 4 - since we'll be there in the evenings, it'll be no problem. I park in the Animal Sciences lot, just east of Clark, accessed via Pitkin (from College).
