Junes program is *New discoveries revealed by geophysics research at Khirbet al-Mafjar, an Early Islamic Qasr near Jericho, Palestine* by **Andy Creekmore, UNC Professor.**

Qasr Hisham, also known as Khirbet al-Mafjar and Hisham's Palace, is an eighth century Islamic estate located near Jericho, Palestine. Excavations a century ago uncovered a palatial compound and baths with magnificent mosaics. These remains have been treated as an isolated monument with a short life history, but recent geophysics research reveals that they are part of a settlement with a more complex history than meets the eye.

Book Review: Douglas Preston

Some of you may know Douglas Preston from his fictional series with author Lincoln Child. But did you know that he has written a few non-fiction books as well. Worth the time to read.

Talking to the Ground - In 1992 Doug Preston and his family rode horseback across 400 miles of desert in Utah, Arizona, and New Mexico. They were retracing the route of the Navajo deity Naayee' neizghani, the Slayer of Alien Gods, on his quest to restore beauty and balance to the Earth. More than a travelogue, Preston's account of the journey is a tale of two cultures meeting in a sacred land. -Amazon.

The Royal Road: El Camino Real from Mexico City to Santa Fe - In 1598 the conquistador Juan de Oñate led the first permanent European settlers to what would become the United States, traveling from Mexico along El Camino Real de Tierra Adentro, the Royal Road of the Interior. In commemoration of the 400th anniversary of this arduous journey, the husband-and-wife author/photographer team of Douglas and Christine Preston, seasoned travelers on the Camino Real, invite us to join them as they journey by car and horseback and on foot along this ancient road, which began thousands of years ago as a series of Indian trails. Christine Preston's photos show wild places that have hardly changed over the centuries as well as churches, ruins, villages, and modern cityscapes. Douglas Preston's text chronicles the history of the road and its travelers. José Antonio Esquibel provides fascinating historical information on the pioneer settlers of New Mexico including the origins and genealogies of old New Mexico families from Abeyta to Zamora. - Amazon

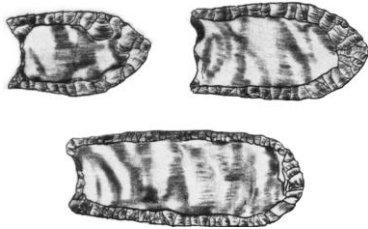
Scandinavian Midsummer Festival
