Program

October Speaker: Matthew Muttart

Matthew earned his B.A. in Anthropology from the University of Victoria, Canada. After the 2014 field season with Dr. Pante at Olduvai Gorge, Tanzania he moved to Fort Collins to pursue his graduate degree in Biological Anthropology.

His research is seeking to reconstruct the ecology of Early Stone Age archaeological sites as this is critical to understanding the conditions and behaviors that led to these accumulations, particularly as hominins encroached on the carnivore guild and regularly consuming flesh and marrow from mammalian carcasses. The abundance of tooth marked bone at these early archaeological sites highlights the potential of these traces to help refine our knowledge of past hominin and carnivore interactions. However, attempts to link tooth marks left on bone to specific carnivore taxa have mostly been unsuccessful due to the two-dimensional techniques. This thesis project is utilizing high-resolution 3D scanning to produce accurate and precise characterizations of tooth mark morphology not applied in any previous research. Samples of tooth marks from modern mammalian carnivores and crocodilians were collected from natural feeding experiments in Serengeti National Park, Tanzania. Feeding experiments have also been conducted at the W.O.L.F Sanctuary in Rist Canyon and the Denver Zoo.

Matthew's talk will provide an overview of research methods and preliminary results of his project. Additionally, he will talk about his field season excavating at Olduvai Gorge this summer because no one wants to listen to him talk for the better part of an hour on nanometer measurements of tooth marks.

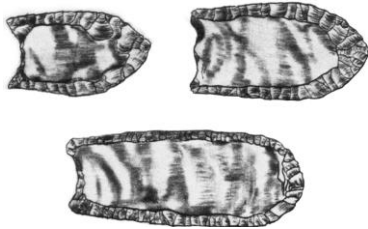
