November Speaker: Andrew Viloudaki

I was born in Denver, but grew up moving around the world with the U.S. Military. First with my parents, and then with my wife and two daughters. I had my first experiences with archaeology on Guam where I conducted most of my undergraduate studies. Most recently I worked with an archaeological contracting firm in Okinawa, Japan before coming to CSU for my Masters degree. This past summer I had the opportunity to attend the CSU field school and conduct separate research in Ouray, CO.

Between 1875 and 1916 Ouray, Colorado was home to a thriving red-light district consisting of about one-fifth of the town. On the southern half of Block 8 a Sporting Complex was largely built, owned and operated by the Vanoli Family and their associates. The Vanoli Sporting Complex (VSC) was excavated pro-bono between 1970 and 1983 by Steven Baker, director of Centuries Research Inc. in order to salvage part of the site before it was destroyed by construction. The Vanoli archaeological collection, now curated at Colorado State University Fort Collins, CO, consists of over 77,000 artifacts. Of this collection an inordinate amount of ammunition is present at much higher concentrations for than in other comparable collections (Spude 2005).

The research I conducted over the summer focused on the legal and social framework within which the VSC existed, using historical documents held at the Ouray City Clerks Office. They allow for the relationship between the stark reality of a western mining town and the Progressive Victorian ethos of the burgeoning middle class to be contextualized. The assemblage of armaments recovered from the excavations in Block 8 stand in direct contradiction to the laws and ordinances of the town of Ouray during the 1875-1916 period, and thus allow us the ability to begin discussing life within the VSC in a holistic manner.

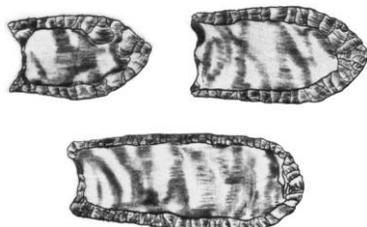
Membership Renewal by Rae Todd
